The evaluators assessed the structure of the submitted study program Economic Policy and Public Administration from the point of view of the potential international accreditation of the study program focused on public administration.

The structure of the self-assessment report and other submitted documents was based on the prescribed template of the PAQUALITY project. Some information would need to be added for the actual accreditation of the Public administration program.

According to the evaluation report, the focus of the Economic Policy and Public Administration study program is based primarily on economic courses, some of which are related to public administration. The same applies to the focus of research and internationalization.

If the study program were to be accredited as a public administration / public policy program, the representation of courses in this area would have to be wider. For this purpose, the evaluators therefore recommend supplementing the curriculum with courses related to political science and public policy, including other social sciences such as sociology, etc. Another recommendation is to expand the range of courses related to law, specifically Administrative Law and Constitutional Law as separate courses. According to the evaluation report, it is recommended to transfer some courses to other part of study (Czech Economy or Information Systems in Public Administration).
